## Annual Meeting Highlights



T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative held its 84th Annual Meeting on Saturday, August 27th, at the BGM High School Auditorium.

Members and guests enjoyed a delicious breakfast catered by Brooklyn Grocery.

Peggy Wardenburg provided the pre-meeting entertainment closing with a salute to the Veterans in attendance and the audience singing “God Bless America” and the “National Anthem” with her.

Pastor Josh Gerard of the New Beginnings Church gave a very nice invocation.

The Annual Meeting was called to order by Board President, Gene Von Ahsen, followed by the introduction of the board.

The Certification of a Quorum and the reading of the Notice of Meeting was given by Ronald Hoffman, Secretary-Treasurer. There were motions to waive the reading of last year’s Annual Meeting Minutes and the Treasurer’s Report.

Mark Adams, Cooperative Attorney, conducted the election of directors and the election results were given by Nominating Committee Chairperson, Davis Axmear. The following were elected for three-year terms: incumbents, Gene Von Ahsen, representing Iowa County, and Anne Axmear, representing Keokuk County, and newly elected was Lisa Tichy, who will be representing Tama County. The amendment was also passed.

Hadley Kiebach, 2022 Iowa Future Little Miss United States Agriculture and 2022 Midwest Future Little Miss United States Agriculture, with the help of her mother, Kate, gave a presentation with Hadley telling the crowd about her pageants, how she represented her title at numerous events, her projects and her animals.

General Manager, Dean A. Huls, presented the Board President and Manager’s Report to the members updating the crowd on this year’s five-year work plan projects which will increase reliability. He gave an overview of your cooperative’s “all of the above” approach to electric generation, supporting the incorporation of new renewable resources alongside reliable, baseload generation. He told members that we are in the process of our scheduled five-year cost of service study with a third party and the results of this study will enable us to manage our costs and operate more efficiently. Lastly, he talked about our current facilities and our needs to provide you with the services that are demanded to supply safe, reliable, affordable electricity for years to come. He then had Sarah Coleman from Martin Gardner Architecture (MGA) and Nate Hopwood, our IT Manager, give a

presentation on our plan to construct a new facility.

Gene Von Ahsen and Dean Huls then presented a Retirement plaque to Director James Hines and thanked him for his 25 years of dedicated service on the board.

The employees then came up and Dean Huls introduced them along with their years of service.

At the end of the meeting, Gene Von Ahsen, and his helper, Martin Gil, son of Karen Gil-Maas of Williamsburg, drew names for the kids bike, grand prizes and electric bill credits.

Each membership in attendance received a thermal tote bag.

With winter weather on the way, now is the time to seal drafty windows. If you can see daylight around a window frame or if you can rattle a window (movement means possible leaks), the window

likely need to be sealed.

Most window leaks can be sealed with caulk or weatherstripping, which come in a variety of compounds and materials. Visit [www.energy.gov/energysaver](http://www.energy.gov/energysaver) to learn how and where to seal air leaks.

"This new program is for rural Iowa students who have a passion for public service, leadership or government," remarked Dean Huls, General Manager. "We want to raise students' awareness of how local electric co-ops power people's lives and empower communities. We also want to talk about exciting cooperative career paths that are available in smaller communities."

Once students register online for the Iowa Youth Leadership Academy, they can attend the webinars from their own computer or mobile device. Each Zoom session will last around 45-60 minutes and focus on a specific topic:

- **Thursday, Oct. 6, 7:00 p.m. - Cooperative Business Model**
- **Tuesday, Oct. 18, 7:00 p.m. - Rural Iowa Advocacy**
- **Thursday, Oct. 27, 7:00 p.m. - Civic Involvement and Leadership**

At the end of each live session, one lucky attendee will be selected at random to win a pair of Apple AirPods. Students who attend all three sessions will be entered into a random drawing for two \$1,000 college scholarships.

During the Zoom sessions, students will be inspired by our lineup of speakers and presenters. Participants will learn how to advocate for issues that are important to them and build leadership skills from a motivational speaker.

## Dress up with care for HALLOWEEN



When dressing your little ones (or yourself), keep these safety tips in mind:

-  Always wear costumes that are labeled flame resistant.
-  Wear bright, reflective costumes or add strips of reflective tape to improve visibility.
-  Do not wear decorative (colored) contact lenses unless you have seen an eyecare professional.
-  Wear makeup and hats rather than costume masks that can obscure or obstruct your vision.
-  Test the makeup you plan to use in advance for a possible allergy.

In addition, inspect any plug-in decorations for signs of wear and tear (fraying or bare wires or broken plugs) and replace them if damaged.



## Electrical Safety Tips for Hunters

We encourage all members to be aware of electrical equipment while hunting. Keep these safety tips in mind as you enjoy the great outdoors.

- Keep clear of electrical equipment.
- Do not shoot at or near power lines or insulators.
- Know where power lines and equipment are located where you hunt.
- Be vigilant in wooded areas where power lines may not be as visible.
- Never place deer stands on utility poles.
- Never place decoys on power lines or other utility equipment.
