Hello everyone, I am Scott Long, your CEO/ General Manager. For some of you I am a familiar face and to others a brand new one. First, I'll give you a little background about myself. I grew up south of Sigourney

on T.I.P. lines on our family farm. I am proud to say that my brother and his son now manage our farm keeping the family tradition growing. In 1997, I received the opportunity to start my lineman career with T.I.P. out of our Sigourney office. For the next fifteen years, I was able to be part of the Sigourney line crew until moving into the Member Service Representative position which brought me to the Brooklyn office to work directly with the members on the many different aspects of member service and staking for a few years. My next step took me back to the Sigourney office as District Manager and continuing to work directly with the membership and line crew. After a few years there, I received the opportunity to manage the operations department where I directed the Brooklyn and Sigourney line crews and worked with the membership and our transmission partners. Four years have gone by, and I am honored to say that I am privileged to serve the member-owners of T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative as your CEO/General Manager.

As I write this note, October is around the corner, that means fall is near and the leaves will be changing soon if they haven't started already. With fall comes harvest and the hustle and bustle of our agriculture economy running at full steam. As the farming equipment increases in size, please look out for overhead power lines and be aware of your underground pedestals and transformers that provide you the electricity for your farmsteads, homes, and businesses. As we state in our safety awareness, "Look Up and Live!".

The progress of our new facility is

staying on track and budget. This has been a project in the works for four years and not one that we have taken lightly to make sure every measure has been taken into account. The ability to get started on our dirt work last fall and prepare for construction has enabled our contractors to get in early this spring and take off. T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative was formed in 1938 with the current facility being built in 1953. In 1965, our first warehouse was built and in 1968 the first addition was added to the current office. With the growth of T.I.P., a second warehouse was built in 1997. In 2001 with the increase in size of the vehicle fleet, door bays were cut open and raised along with the second addition to the office. All this work was completed by 2002. Ongoing maintenance issues with our 70 year old facility and the physical size increases of our service equipment have challenged our staff. This has been compounded by the storage requirements for our inventory during supply chain interruptions. It was clear to see that we definitely needed to come up with a solution. This new facility will ensure that we can meet the needs and deliver reliable electricity to our membership well into the future. We are proud to be a part of another important milestone in the growth of our service to the memberowners of T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative.

Have a bountiful, safe harvest and an enjoyable holiday season with your family and friends and I look forward to another update for you in January.



Annual Meeting Highlights

T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative held its 85th Annual Meeting on Wednesday, August 23, at the cooperative headquarters in Brooklyn.

The Annual Meeting was called to order by Board President, Gene Von Ahsen.

The Certification of a Quorum, the reading of the Notice of the Meeting and Treasurer's Report was given by Ronald Hoffman, Secretary-Treasurer. There were motions to waive the reading of last year's Annual Meeting Minutes.

The new 2023 election process was explained by Mark Adams, Cooperative Attorney, and the report of the Nominating Committee and election results were given by Nominating Committee Chairperson, Ronald Waechter. Jackie Wallace has been a volunteer for Miracles in Motion for 34 years. Miracles in Motion was established in 1988 and has provided an opportunity for persons with disabilities to participate through riding and other activities with therapy horses. Jackie has had a life-long passion for horses and spent hundreds of hours in her youth riding, showing, and training

horses. Miracles in Motion has been the perfect opportunity for Jackie to volunteer and share her love of riding with others.

Miracles in Motion is a volunteer-intensive program, using up to three volunteers per rider: a horse leader and one to two sidewalkers who help keep the riders safe and to help them respond to instructions. They offer different classes and also sessions for professional therapists to bring their clients. Riders gain strength, mobility, improved speech, better focus and many other benefits while riding and from being in the sensory-rich environment at Miracles in Motion.

Jackie has worked in nearly every aspect of their program, including horse leader, sidewalker, horse trainer, property maintenance, public presentations, Board member, volunteer recruiting and training, fundraising, administrative work, and taking mini horse ambassadors on visits. She has also served on Miracles committees, chairing two of them and co-chairing two regional (Iowa and five adjacent states) therapeutic riding conferences. Throughout the years Jackie has completed over 6,000 volunteer hours and driven thousands of miles. She has worked with dozens of horses and hundreds of riders and walked hundreds of miles in classes. She has also taught swimming lessons to people with disabilities. Working with these individuals has been very rewarding for Jackie.

Miracles in Motion is currently pursuing construction of a larger barn that will also include a volunteer center and space for equipment maintenance.

T.I.P. REC would like to thank Jackie for volunteering and making a difference in so many individual's lives.

This October, as we celebrate Co-op Month, we're focused on the ways "Co-ops Grow" for their memberowners.


