#### **Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month**

Did you know ceiling fans can make a room feel four degrees cooler? To save energy through ceiling fan use, remember to raise your thermostat a few degrees while fans are turned on. Ceiling fans can help improve comfort year-round. In the summer, operate ceiling fans in a counterclockwise direction. Reverse the direction to clockwise during winter months and set fans on a low speed so warm air can circulate from the ceiling to the lower levels of the room.

### **Notice of Patronage Dividends Payments**

In accordance with a policy change enacted in 2018 by a vote of your Board of Directors, all active members will receive patronage dividends in the form of a bill credit. That bill credit will be applied to your bill mailed on August 10th.

This year's patronage dividend includes allocations for the following years:

- 25% of 2006 Allocations
- 70% of 2007 Allocations
- 10% of 2022 Allocations

By not printing and mailing a paper check, your Cooperative is being both environmentally friendly and financially efficient.

### Keep Kids Safe Around Trees and Power Lines



When kids take a break from indoor activities, they may head outdoors to play. If they will be climbing trees, scope out the area first to ensure that the treetops do not have power lines running through them.

Not realizing power lines are energized, children may reach up to grab a line or accidently come too close to it when they are playing or sitting high up in a tree.

Even if the power lines are not touching the tree, contact could happen once weight is added to the branch.

In addition, teach kids to fly kites, drones and remote control planes or toys in open areas free from power lines.

If a toy or other object lands in a substation, please call us and we will retrieve the item. Never approach the fence or try to enter the substation area.

Please take the time to teach children and teens how to respect and identify potential electrical hazards.

### Efficiency Upgrades to Help you Save

Speaking of *smart*, additional devices like smart LED bulbs also offer convenient control and help boost energy savings at home. With smart lighting, you can set a schedule for when and how your lights should be turned on or off. Smart lights come in a variety of shapes, colors and brightness levelsand you can purchase bulbs for indoor or outdoor use. Schedule outdoor smart lights to illuminate your home at night and when you're out of town for better security.

While it's not as trendy as incorporating smart technologies, sealing air leaks around your home is a simple, effective way to save energy and lower your bills. Applying new (or replacing old) weather stripping around doors and windows can instantly make your home more comfortable and reduce energy waste. Applying caulk to fill gaps can also improve the seal of your home. Caulk can be applied to a variety of areas, including windows, doors, bathtubs and sinks.

If your home feels too warm during summer (and too chilly during winter) even after you've sealed with weather stripping and caulk, your home may need additional insulation. Insulation is considered a more expensive efficiency upgrade; however, if your home is under-insulated, additional insulation can make a big impact on reducing energy use and costs. The cost of new insulation depends on a variety of factors like materials, size of the home and whether you use a contractor. Typically, the project costs can be recouped in a few years and your home will immediately feel more comfortable.

Of course, there are additional efficiency upgrades that can make a big impact on energy use, like replacing old appliances with ENERGY-STAR® models or replacing old, leaky windows with new, energy efficient windows. But these upgrades can be a bit pricey.

If you're wanting to make your home energy efficient but you're not sure where to start, your best bet is to enlist the help of an expert to conduct an energy audit of your home. T.I.P. REC offers a residential energy audit performed by third-party company that provides infrared pictures that show air leaks and hot and cold spots in your home at a cost of \$175.00.
